The plans and designs for the work were scratched or carved into or drawn on the surface of the board. The earliest Trestleboard (or more accurately Tracing Board), was thought to have been a wooden board covered in wax. The designs were cut or carved into the wax. The wax could be scraped off and renewed as needed. A modern-day Trestleboard in Operative vocations is the Blueprint.

Brothers, we're exploring the relationship of Freemasonry and the American Civil War. Last month, we looked at how Masonry was strained along with most other institutions – family, friends, business associates, etc. But, spoiler alert, the Craft survived. This month, I'd like to point out an example of how we survived.

A SAVANNAH STORY

Found in the records of a lodge in Savannah, Georgia is a story of how, with war raging, Confederate soldiers helped a Union Brother complete a Masonic degree. According to an article from the Georgia Masonic Messenger, shortly after the start of the war, Union soldiers captured the beaches on Hilton Head. Before long, the northerners sent a message under the white flag: A Union soldier had passed through the Fellowcraft Degree before shipping out, and they wanted to see if a nearby lodge could test and raise him to a Master Mason.

Within days, a detail of Confederate cavalry escorted the Fellowcraft Mason and several Master Masons of the north safely through the Confederate Lines and over 30 miles of Confederate defenses to Savannah and the local Masonic lodge. The records note that this Brother was proficient in the Fellowcraft Degree, and he was raised to the Degree of a Master Mason. After the ritual was complete, the Confederate cavalry returned their Brothers to Hilton Head without incident.

Now if this doesn't tug at your heart a little, your heart is too hard, and you need Jesus. We'll pick up here next month with another story of a masonic memorial ceremony during the Battle of Gettysburg.

Until then, please take a few minutes to reflect on why you petitioned the lodge and wanted to become a Mason to begin with. I am about to reach out to a few fellas who haven't paid their dues. Regardless of the reason, I want to make sure Masonry and our Lodge is meeting their expectations. God has blessed us all with different talents and our diversity truly is our strength. 


