



The Trestleboard is the name for the newsletter of Freemasons. A Trestleboard was a tool utilized by Operative Master Masons to detail the daily work of the Craftsman. The plans and designs for the work were scratched or carved into or drawn on the surface of the board. The earliest Trestleboard (or more accurately Tracing Board), was thought to have been a wooden board covered in wax. The designs were cut or carved into the wax. The wax could be scraped off and renewed as needed. A modern-day Trestleboard in Operative vocations is the Blueprint.

We know he was born in England in the 5th Century, A.D. and was kidnapped by Irish pirates at about the age of 16. He returned to Ireland to convert pagans to Christianity in Northern and Western Ireland eventually becoming a Bishop, sight unknown Later became the Patron

Saint of Ireland. The year of his death is also, uncertain, but usually attributed to 493 A.D. and the date of his death is ascribed to March 17.



About a millennium transpires before we find solid evidence of Masonry in Ireland, the Baal's Bridge Square, 1507. This was an artifact found at an ancient building site of the Baal Bridge, records found referring to the Bridge in 1558. In the early 1600's there are many records from "lodges" recording minutes of meetings which, although being operative Lodges, demonstrate a willingness to have "speculative" Masons join them.. The history is fascinating and fun. Take time to explore our institution.

St. Patrick was a devout Christian Bishop who helped bring Ireland into the Christian beliefs that so many Irish relish and paved the way for Masonry to take hold.

# Greg Treible Senior Warden



Brothers, for the last couple of months, we've been exploring the relationship between Freemasonry and the American Civil War. Last month, we looked at how a group of Confederate Master Masons escorted a Union fellowcraft to a lodge in the south to confer a Master Mason degree and safely return the newly raised brother back to the North.

#### Friend to Friend Masonic Memorial

Located in the south-side of Gettysburg, <u>The Friend to Friend Masonic Memorial</u> depicts Union General Winfield Scott Hancock and Confederate General Lewis Addison Armistead. These Generals were personal friends and members of Freemasonry having fought together prior to the Civil War. However, as with many during this time, these brothers were forced to be adversaries.

During the Battle of Gettysburg, Armistead was mortally wounded when he bravely breached Hancock's line. Union Captain Henry Bingham, a Mason, and staff assistant to General Hancock, bent low in the battlefield to provide aid to the Confederate general. The memorial displays Armistead handing over his personal watch to Captain Bingham to be taken to his dear friend General Hancock. General Armistead did not survive. These two Generals and a Masonic Captain, thrown into conflict, were united by their friendship and dedication to being compassionate men.

On the monument, an inscription reads:

This monument is presented by the Right Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Pennsylvania and dedicated as a memorial to the Freemasons of the Union and the Confederacy. Their unique bonds of friendship enabled them to remain a brotherhood undivided, even as they fought in a divided nation, faithfully supporting the respective governments under which they lived.

Despite these years of bloodshed and disagreement, Freemasons established a stronger fraternity that embraced differences. An organization where men could meet in friendship and grace even in times of war.

Sometimes contentious items or issues can arise in lodge. The noble contention of who can best work and best agree becomes critical (i.e., it's how we handle the issue as brothers and not the issue or decision itself that matters). When such issues arise, I can't think of a better example of how to treat our brethren than the two Civil War examples we reviewed these last two months.

# Tom Tompkins, PM Hallboard President




Greetings from your Hallboard.
