

The Trestleboard is the name for the newsletter of Freemasons. A Trestleboard was a tool utilized by Operative Master Masons to detail the daily work of the Craftsman. The plans and designs for the work were scratched or carved into or drawn on the surface of the board. The earliest Trestleboard (or more accurately Tracing Board), was thought to have been a wooden board covered in wax. The designs were cut or carved into the wax. The wax could be scraped off and renewed as needed. A modern-day Trestleboard in Operative vocations is the Blueprint.

We plan to have full representation at Annual Communication for 2023.

Yet many escaped and made their way to other lands, especially Ireland where much Masonic lore still resonates. While being placed at the stake for his execution, DeMolay announced that before a year was up, both King Philip and Pope Clement would be dead, both died in 1314.

On Saturday, Oct. 13, 1792, the Corner Stone for the Presidents House, later known as the White House. Washington never resided there. First couple was John and Abigail Adams who only lived there for 4 months. Thomas Jefferson then took office and moved into the building. As I am sure you recall, it was burned by the British in 1814 and the rebuilding was supervised by James Hoban, Thomas Jefferson's personal architect.

Greetings Brothers and Ladies,

This month, we continue our exploration of Masonry in Colonial America. It may be helpful to review last month's JW trestle board article as a refresher of the context for this article.

How did someone who was not a mason learn what occurred at meetings?

As far as we know, the first Masonic book published in the colonies was Benjamin Franklin's reprint of Anderson's constitution in 1733. Franklin sent

copies of that book to Boston and the Carolinas for sale. We also know there were Masonic orations and sermons being published in the colonies in the 1740s, 50s, including two in Annapolis in 1751.

As far as the publishing of the actual secret work of Freemasonry, the rituals, those were exposed in the 1720s in newspapers and pamphlets by Freemasons or lapsed Freemasons. Unfortunately (for the individuals responsible, not the Craft), those exposures were very prominent by the 1750s. I say it's unfortunate for those responsible because their disloyalty to their obligation presents a personal moral failing (a character flaw that I'm sure had to have haunted them) and ironically undermines their credibility. To the extent that non-masons knew that masons took oaths to keep secrets, I wonder how could they have believed a thing an ex-mason shared (the secrets they exposed) considering that by the act of sharing the secret work, the ex-mason was violating his oath to God, to himself and his brethren? While we don't know exactly what ritual George Washington received when he joined in 1752, those exposures of the ritual around 1760 likely provide clues.

Did Masonry influence the American Revolution?

It is often important to delineate between institutions and individuals. While a government may be "good" there are bad politicians. While a corporation may be responsible for doing bad things to make a profit, there may be "good" officers within the corporation who strive to do the right thing and behave according to moral principles. Likewise, Masonry, through individual masons who fought during the War for Independence, had at least an indirect influence. However, it would be difficult to say the Craft conspired to directly influence the war.

George Washington and Ben Franklin were masons, but Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton were not. And even men who are known to have been masons like Major General Henry Knox, there is no record of him being a Freemason until well after the revolution. The men who supported Freemasonry and who tended to join Freemasonry in Washington's era were men who believed in self-determination, Republic virtues, peaceful assembly of people, freedom of the press and freedom of religion – all of which were radical ideas in continental Europe. Because these ideas directly challenged the authority of the church and crown, the Roman Catholic Church, kings and emperors went after Freemasons in places like France, Bavaria, Italy and Spain. The ideas and values gave birth to both speculative Masonry and America.

Next month we'll further unpack the connection between the Craft and the American Revolution.
